henever Advent begins the big question that always enters my mind is; am I going to have a "Mary" Christmas or a "Martha" Christmas? I am sure you are familiar with the verses Luke 10:38-42 where Jesus ends with "Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her."

As the LWML English District President, I always strive for a "Mary" Christmas but inevitably end up with a "Martha" Christmas. Not only is this a special treat for the recipients of meals but it gives the volunteers a break from making a dessert for one of the days they are scheduled to provide meals. It is also a good opportunity for us to study God's word and enjoy some Christian fellowship. Other possibilities are helping with a soup kitchen or donating items to a food pantry. Possibly you could look inside your own congregation, maybe there is an elderly couple or a single mother that could use some help with a meal, or cleaning, or they may just need someone to sit and talk or join them in a devotion or prayer.



But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth His Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons (Galatians 4:4-5).

Advent is a special time in the Church Year. It is a time when we prepare for the coming of Jesus. There is a lot of excitement as we look back and celebrate the coming of Jesus as a baby in a Bethlehem manger long ago. We also eagerly look forward to the second advent of Jesus, the day when He will return in glory to make all things new again.

Advent means "*coming*," and the focus of the season is on the coming of Jesus. Long ago, Adam and Eve sinned and ate the forbidden fruit. Even as they were cast out of paradise, they were given a promise. They were told that a child was coming, a child that would crush the serpent's head.

After being sent away from the Garden, Adam and Eve had to deal with pain and suffering and death. They had to go through the grief of losing their son Abel at the hand of his brother Cain.

"Mites at Work Freely Sowing, Serving & Sharing"

he LWML English District mite offerings continue their work of **Freely Sowing, Serving & Sharing** the Gospel of Jesus Christ. At the time of your reading this, two more mission grants have been paid, bringing the total mission grants awarded thus far to \$7,000.

The seed for our second mission grant, Catechisms for Sudan & Sudanese Immigrants, was **sown** in 1992 with the founding of the Lutheran Heritage Foundation (LHF). Since that time, LHF has **shared** the Gospel and **sown** seeds of faith in 100 different languages in 83 countries. Typically LHF, a Recognized **Service** Organization (RSO) of the LCMS, begins **sharing** the word by translating Luther's Small Catechism and, depending on the needs and request of the church, continues with children's material, devotionals, hymnals, and other resources and texts for seminarians and pastors.

The Holy Spirit has worked mightily through LHF's books, **sowing, serving** and **sharing** in Sudan, Africa. Twenty years ago, LHF sent Andrew Elisa five copies of the English language Luther's Small Catechism and a Book of Concord. Excited by what he read, Andrew eagerly **shared** this good Lutheran doctrine with everyone he met, eventually founding the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Sudan, today called the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Sudan, today called the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Sudan-South Sudan, or ELCS-SS. Today the ELCS-SS includes approximately 100 Lutheran churches, five Lutheran elementary school and two kindergartens located throughout Sudan, attended by more than 20,000 baptized Lutherans.

Luther's Small Catechism is the primary resource used by the ELCS-SS for **sowing** the seeds of faith in Muslim Sudan and Animist South Sudan and among Sudanese immigrants here in the United States and Canada. As at Pentecost the Holy Spirit gave the disciples power to preach the Gospel in the languages of the people, so too does the \$3,000 grant provide Luther's Small Catechism in the Nuer, Zande, Acholi, Bari and Moru languages **serving** Sudanese people in Sudan and North America by **sharing** the Gospel in their own languages.

The seed for our third mission grant, Operation Barnabas Committee Calvary Lutheran Church, was first **sown** in 2007 when LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces initiated Operation Barnabas. Operation Barnabas **serves** to equip LCMS congregations for compassionate care and Gospel**sharing** outreach to military members, families and veterans. The Operation Barnabas Committee at Calvary Evangelical Lutheran Church in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania is partnering with the Veteran Outreach Office of the YWCA of Greater Harrisburg in an ongoing program to **serve** homeless female veterans by assembling and distributing comfort bags to them and to their children. Every bag contains a sealed card with female veteran specific information for help from the Veteran's Administration and contact information for Calvary Lutheran Church. One of the most important features of the bags is the inclusion of pocket New Testaments and Psalms – **sowing** the seed of the Gospel.

The \$2,000 grant is helping to fill comfort bags, enabling the Operation Barnabas Committee at Calvary Evangelical Lutheran Church to **serve** homeless female veterans and their children by providing for their physical needs and by **sowing** the seed of God's Word.►



1st CANDLE – (purple) THE PROPHECY CANDLE or CANDLE OF HOPE – We can have hope because God is faithful and will keep the promises made to us. Our hope comes from God. (Romans 15:12-13)

- 2nd CANDLE (purple) THE BETHLEHEM CANDLE or THE CANDLE OF PREPARATION – God kept his promise of a Savior who would be born in Bethlehem. Preparation means to "get ready". Help us to be ready to welcome YOU, O GOD! (Luke 3:4-6)
- 3rd CANDLE (pink) THE SHEPHERD CANDLE or THE CANDLE OF JOY – The angels sang a message of JOY! (Luke 2:7-15)
- 4th CANDLE (purple) THE ANGEL CANDLE or THE CANDLE OF LOVE – The angles announced the good news of a Savior. God sent his only Son to earth to save us, because he loves us! (John 3:16-17)
- 5th CANDLE (white) "CHRIST CANDLE" The white candle reminds us that Jesus is the spotless lamb of God, sent to wash away our sins! His birth was for his death, his death was for our birth! (John 1:29)
