

Time flies when you're having fun. I'm sure you've felt this way at the end of an LWML Convention, Rally, or servant event. "Where did the time go?", "All I did was blink and it was over." I often feel this way about the Christmas and Easter seasons. And I certainly feel this way about my time as English District Pastoral Counselor. It has been a joy and one of the greatest honors of my ministry to serve alongside the Executive Committee and every LWML member these past four years. I'd like to summarize my time as pastoral counselor and my experience with the LWML with three biblical words, "Joy", "Fellowship", and "Boldness".

"Boldness". In the early days of the church, shortly after the day of Pentecost, the believers gathered to pray to the Lord. God's gift of the Holy Spirit had come, but so had opposition to the Gospel message. As they gathered, they prayed, "And now, Lord, look upon their threats and grant to your servants to continue to speak your word with all boldness" (Acts 4:29). In the past four years I have been privileged to witness God's gift of boldness in the women of the LWML. The women of the LWML English District and National LWML serve the Lord without fear, undaunted by opposition or obstacles. Problems and limitations such as the pandemic and demographic shifts regarding church attendance have not hindered the proclamation of the Gospel and the works of mercy funded and carried out by the LWML. In the midst of struggle, I've watched Lutheran women serving the Lord with gladness. The bold witness of the LWML has been a gift to me, to the church, and to the world.

"Fellowship". When I hear this word, my brain immediately jumps to potlucks and church picnics, and I'm guessing yours does too. And I would contend that this is exactly right! It isn't the delicious food that makes a potluck, church picnic, or LWML convention "fellowship", but the conversations, love, and mutual consolation that take place at these events. It has been a privilege to watch Lutheran women engaged in true fellowship in my time on the Executive Committee. I've watched you bear one another's burdens. I've seen you rejoice together and mourn together. At the district and national conventions, I've seen sisters in Christ laugh together, cry together, and pray for one another - both in worship services and in the middle of lunches and meetings. Love in Christ binds us together. We are all part of one body. The LWML is a place where true fellowship, rooted in Christ, can be found.

"Joy". "Serve the Lord with gladness". The devil despises Christian joy. He wants us to be disenchanted, despondent, and cynical. He wants us to be downhearted, depressed about the future of the church, and weary under the burdens of this life. But God gives us the gift of Christian joy. Jesus is risen! Death's reign is over! Your sins have been destroyed! The devil's time is short! Though, as the Lord says, "In this world, you will have trouble..." (John 14:27a), the Good News of Christ's triumph and His constant presence among us in Word and Sacrament, enable us to have joy in all circumstances. This joy shines through the LWML. I saw it as we gathered in Lexington for the first National Convention after the pandemic. I've seen it at servant events and ingathering activities. And of course, I've seen it as our voices were joined in song praising the Lord and as we gathered around His table to receive a foretaste of the feast to come in His body and blood.

Thank you for the privilege of serving these past four years. May God continue to grant you boldness, fellowship, and joy.

Happy and Blessed New Year and warm thanks from the EDLWML Nominating Committee as we prepare for the upcoming convention in Detroit. Our committee wishes to thank each nominee for allowing her name to be placed on the ballot to be elected for office in our next biennium. We want you to know that you are doing a great service for many people who you may never meet on this side of My Confirmation verse has served me well since May 3, heaven.

When my husband and I were in Guatemala as missionaries, we counted so many times when the LWML helped us with funds for buildings, clinics, health programs, schools, chapels, and, most of all, how they encouraged us as a young couple to share the good news of Jesus' love. We know from other missionaries that LWML does that throughout the world. Sometimes it is a national grant like the one we received for \$50,000 for well-baby clinics in our small town, on banana plantation sites, and in remote villages without electricity and running water. We know those clinics saved the lives of many children and adults who were vulnerable to so many diseases. Paramedics were trained to give vaccinations against measles, mumps, tetanus—sicknesses that often claimed the lives of people in the poorest of circumstances. Midwives were trained to safely deliver babies in those communities, too. Mothers were taught ways to increase protein in their family diets and provide safe drinking water.

We were able to establish schools, build chapels for worship—building blocks for the ministries that have continued to this day. LWML makes a difference for so many people. We were especially proud that during COVID, LWML did not fail to meet its mission goals, and even surpassed them, even though many societies could not meet in person. The hearts of LWML women never forgot their mission to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ in Word and deed.

That is why our nominating committee wants to thank the women nominees who are willing to continue the work of our English District LWML through their service, and we want to encourage each of you to be willing to step up in the future to fulfill the spaces of the women who have come before us. God can equip each of us to serve in some way through the LWML.

The past decade on the EC has been full of blessing, friendship, and fun, which certainly made the work a joy – one that I would encourage others to experience. Yes, I am appealing to YOU to consider a position on the EC. If you aren't quite ready for that, then a zone position or a position within your congregation's LWML group. Did I hear you say "But..."?

Well, then reference my Confirmation verse...BUT seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

The preceding verses in Matthew's gospel review the worries that we allow the devil, the world, and our sinful flesh to use against us. I think all too often when considering service of one kind or another we allow our worries to become twisted into excuses. The narrative goes something like this: VP of Organizational Resources gently inquires, "Say, (insert name here), I could certainly use more members on the bylaws committee. I think you would be great at it. Would you please prayerfully consider serving in this way?" This sincere appeal is often met with resistance and often that resistance is out of fear. We worry that we won't have enough time, that we don't possess the right skill set, that we already have too much on our plate. Yes, sometimes these assessments ARE true, however, I challenge you to rethink the "but" that is often a default of resistance. Instead, reference the BUT that is God's gift to us in Matthew 6. In this chapter God provides instruction on humble service, prayer and seeking him above all else. This is a perfect place to start your prayerful consideration of Serving the Lord with Gladness in the LWML.


As we added further seminary students at Seminario Concordia el Reformador at the beginning of this academic year, something to get used to is that our new student from Venezuela and his son, are both named Jesús (pronounced 'Heysoos')! Jesús is a common Latino name for men, and the confusion with the name of our Lord is avoided by the fact that Lord's name is usually spelled Jesucristo (Jesus Christ). We still await the arrival of four students from Haiti - two who are new students and two returning. They have been delayed in their arrival by problems with visas and political issues at the border between Haiti and the DR. Similar visa problems are being experienced by a student from Cuba, so we ask for prayers that these 5 men can get to the DR as soon as possible.

Greetings from Braşov. The snow is starting to fall here in the Carpathian Mountains of Romania. 

From the Archives...

Dr. Theodore Graebner, a Lutheran professor and pastor at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri, wrote in 1943: "If our church librarians or archivists wish to have future generations call them blessed, let them keep complete files of church papers, programs, special services, and newspaper notices from which the history of the church may be gathered by those who come after us." (CHI Information Sheet 2, 2022, page 1) Though Dr. Graebner's comment was directed toward congregations, the sentiment is shared by Concordia Historical Institute and messaged to all synodical organizations.

The Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) echoes this call for the preservation of its history: 1) to tell the story through the Word as we worship and organize Bible study in our group, 2) to tell the story of our Mission as we participate through Mites and reach out to our community, and 3) to tell the story of our Fellowship as we build relationships over the generations through retreats, events and working together.

The LWML of the English District, recognizing the significance of preserving its history, included the first "Historian's Report" in the program for

the June 1950 Biennial Convention. In her report, Mrs. Edwin H. (Ruth) Theidel, Vice-President and Historian, described the historian's job as the "Keeper of the

Scrap Book." Today, the Archivist-Historian is an appointed, two-year position eligible for reappointment. Per the Bylaws, the primary duties of the Archivist-Historian are to write the history of the LWML English District activities and to preserve records and historical materials.

Dr. Graebner's emphasis on maintaining a historical record for future generations holds true, but as the current Archivist-Historian, I have come to appreciate the present blessings of this task. Exploring the extensive record of service and witnessing by the women of the English District over the past eight decades has left me in awe of the Lord's work accomplished through them.

2024-26 BIENNIUM

ENGLISH DISTRICT MISSION GRANT PROPOSALS (SYNOPSIS)

1. Answers for Life:

\$3,000 to provide Bibles and pro-life literature in Spanish and English to use in counseling clients.

2. Servants of the Gospel Through Dots of Love (Lutheran Braille Workers):

\$3,000 will fund the transcription of at least 25 new subject-specific Lutheran titles into Braille so people who are blind, and the participants in the Prison Transcription Program will know Jesus as their Savior.

3. Gifts for All God's Children Connection Kids to Christ Tutoring Expansion:

\$3,000 for the purchase of educational supplies including iPads and computers so children can be connected to Christ and improve academically so they have a hope and future.

4. Orphan Grain Train:

\$1,850 to purchase a hot water heater (to help disinfect and sterilize the durable medical equipment, the sorting tables, and floors of the warehouse); and to repair the loading dock, which is broken and currently unusable.

5. Camp Restore Detroit:

\$3,000 to build a play area to enhance the community centers currently being built in an impoverished area of Detroit with active community leaders willing to work with Camp Restore Detroit to help combat the cycle of poverty and restore the sense of community and family in the area.

6. Operation Barnabas Support to Women Warriors:

\$3,000 to supply Women Warrior clients in Tucson with food and gas gift cards. Extra-large print Bibles and LCMS tracts will be available to hand out with the cards. Goal: so these women can feel God's love and will never be alone to suffer the world's deficiencies.

7. In Every Language – Funding Translators for the MOST Ministries Teams:

\$3,000 to be used to hire competent local translators to assist MOST ministry teams as they share the life-giving Gospel of Jesus Christ through their eyeglasses, water filtration and other short term mission teams.

8. Spreading the Gospel in Muslim Nigeria:

\$3,000 for the Lutheran Heritage Foundation to provide 600+ books like "A Summary of Christian Doctrine" and "Unchanging Truths in Changing Times" in languages like Hausa and Yala, giving Nigerian pastors and people the tools they need to share the Gospel in their land.

9. Eyewitness for Life (a free pregnancy resource center):

\$3,000 to provide free ultrasounds, pregnancy information and options, care connections, adoption referrals, and doctor recommendations.

10. Healing the Wounds of Trauma in American Indian/Native Alaskan Communities:

\$3,000 to offer programs like "Healing the Wounds of Trauma: How the Church Can Help" to equip local leaders with biblical and mental health principals so that traumatized people can experience the life-changing message of the Bible using Bible stories, scripture, etc.

Ministries Supported

Elli's House—Founded in 2017, Elli's House serves homeless and runaway women involved in human trafficking in the city of Detroit. Their mission is to abolish sex trafficking in the city through building relationships, offering safe shelter, food, clothing, and hygiene needs. They also seek to educate the public about sex trafficking through speaking engagements, training programs, and promotional events.

Most Ministries—A mission-sending agency which provides Christians the opportunity to live out their faith. Working with missionaries and churches throughout the world, Most Ministries is designed to foster self-sufficiency

in the lives of those being served. Responding to fielddriven requests, teams have provided Eyeglass Clinics, Water Filtration, Health & Hygiene Education, Construction, Medical Clinics, and English as a Second Language.

Phil's Friends—Mission is to provide Christ-centered support and hope to those affected by cancer. Phil's Friends' Vision is that they will expand to a sustainable international organization by implementing new programs, increasing services, expanding volunteer opportunities, and developing needed support for individuals and families affected by cancer. Each week hundreds of individuals volunteer in Phil's Friends Hope Centers. Together, they assemble care packages, decorate boxes, and color Cards of Hope that will be sent across the country to those affected by cancer.

Camp Restore Detroit—a ministry serving in the 9th Precinct of Detroit. Its goal is to partner with the community to restore this neighborhood. They do this by working alongside the community to encourage the good already happening and providing extra hands and feet. They serve the community in three ways:

Environmental—clearing overgrown plants and trash.

Construction—assisting community members with basic construction projects on their homes.

Human Care—building relationships with the community and sharing God's love.

EQUALIZATION INFORMATION AND FORM 2024

EQUALIZATION...is a method of endeavoring to equalize travel costs for LWML District convention delegates. In order to make the plan function it is necessary to have as near 100% participation as possible from all zones and individual societies in the English District. Even if a unit will not be sending a delegate to the convention (though you will miss a lot if you don't), you should still send in the amount set for equalization...that's what makes it EQUAL! Each zone is entitled to send one delegate and societies two delegates to represent them at convention.

BECAUSE...of the high cost of airfares, we encourage all zones and societies within a fair driving distance of Detroit to drive and/or car-pool when possible. All travel arrangements will be the responsibility of each delegate. The mileage allowance for a delegate driver is calculated using the current IRS mileage rate. Reimbursement can only be requested by the delegate driving; unless there are extenuating circumstances, which would need to be reviewed on a case by case basis. Only one delegate per car will be compensated for travel. Maximum payment will not exceed the lowest available coach airfare. The equalization chairman will reimburse your mileage with documentation of the round trip using mapping software (MapQuest etc.) based on the most direct route. Also, be prepared to provide a printed copy of what the round trip air fare would have cost even if you drive.

BECAUSE...women's attendance at LWML conventions is really leadership training for local congregations, we encourage you to ask your congregation's finance committee to include funds for equalization in the convention and conference segment of their annual budgets.

PARTICIPATION...for the 2024 LWML English District 41st Biennial Convention in Detroit, MI is \$200.00 per delegate and \$200.00 for the zone president. We are encouraging all zones and societies to send in their payment(s) as soon as possible. The deadline for the total payment is March 31, 2024.
