History of Valentine's Day

The Catholic Church recognizes at least three different saints named Valentine or Valentinus, all of whom were martyred. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.

Other stories suggest that Valentine may have been killed for attempting to help Christians escape harsh Roman prisons, where they were often beaten and tortured. According to one legend, an imprisoned Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself after he fell in love with a young girl—possibly his jailor's daughter—who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter signed "From your Valentine," an expression that is still in use today. Although the truth behind the Valentine legends is murky, the stories all emphasize his appeal as a sympathetic, heroic and

-most importantly-romantic figure. By the Middle Ages, perhaps thanks to this reputation, Valentine would become one of the most popular saints in England and France. [From History Channel]

When the Ark of the Covenant was brought back to Jerusalem and placed inside the new tabernacle, King David offered this song of thanksgiving. Mission Grant #3 for \$3,000

Boldly Declaring Y'SHUA as Messiah in Israel

The Apple of his Eye Mission Society was formed in 1996 by Steve Cohen after serving 20 years as field counselor for Jewish evangelism in North America.

To reach the Jewish people in declaring that Y'SHUA as Messiah, leaders are needed to be trained in word and sacrament. These leaders need to be Israeli citizens who already confess Y'SHUA as Messiah, so they have easier access to the Jewish people.

The \$3,000 will be used for the recruiting, training and deployment of the leaders.

What we must realize is that "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of GOD."

Formerly with the English District, Rev. Dr. Robert Roegner and Kristi are now missionaries with Apple of His Eye Mission Society. They have focused on partnership development for the last six months. This means they must raise their own financial and prayer support from congregations, societies and individuals. They have also been studying the Israeli and Hebrew culture along with the language. In February they are leading 48 people to see the Holy Land with another trip planned for November.

This was the theme verse for Follow the Leader, the LWML 2018 Assembly of Leaders Training held November 7-10, in St. Louis, Missouri. President Darlene Keca and I were privileged to be part of this 185 person gathering filled with practical leadership ideas, inspiration and hands-on activities intended to be shared with our LWML English District zones and congregations.

LWML Past President Linda Reiser was the first plenary speaker. Her opening talk, Lutheran Women Inspire, challenged attendees to overcome doubt in their leadership by trusting in God and relying on faith to lead with no reservations, no retreats and no regrets. In a later presentation she gave very practical instruction on Podium Protocol & Speaking Etiquette, acknowledging that public speaking is something that many fear. All would do well to heed her advice to pray before speaking and to remember that, "It's not about you – it's about what you are giving to the audience."

In addition to 8 inspirational and practical plenary sessions, each participant was able to choose 6 of 8 breakout sessions: Essential Technology Today; Sharing Active leadership Techniques; Resources: We've Got Them!; Mission Grant Selection & Distribution; Engage & Retain Volunteers; Reaching Different Cultures & Generations; Taking it to the Streets!; Basic Protocol & Structure. A wealth of information was presented in these sessions, most of which is accessible at www.LWML.org.

The information we received and the interactions we had with a wide variety of LWML leaders was invaluable to us. Before leaving St. Louis, Darlene and I were well equipped to complete our district Initial Plan of Action for Zone and Group Events and submit it to the Assembly of Leaders Strategic Plan Facilitator. As stated in that document, our goal is to introduce the women of the English District to the LWML resources available, how to access them and then by the power of the Holy Spirit, be equipped to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Our objectives for accomplishing this goal are targeted training for LWML English District Executive Committee and equipping zone presidents to tailor training to local needs.

Because of our unique non-geographic status, we made special efforts to connect with leaders in districts that are near our English District zones so that we may partner with them in future training events. This is an exciting way for us to pool resources and form relationships with our sisters in Christ in other districts across the country.

Darlene and I are grateful for the opportunity to attend Follow the Leader and we look forward with renewed zeal to serving you as we all follow THE leader, Jesus Christ.
